## President's Report



The first year of my Presidency has been both challenging and rewarding. Leading the Association is a great honour and a humbling experience. I would like to thank both Peter Boland and Nelma Wright, past Presidents, for their guidance, council and support. It has been most welcome.

Following on from last season we continued to have the ever-present disruption from Covid hanging over our heads. Thankfully we lost very little time due to Covid. Covid did present a significant amount of uncertainty. We saw Cricket Australia putting Umpires in bubbles at short notice. Some of our members also had to pull out of games at short notice. Thank you to all for your patience and understanding in what was a very trying season. The weather looked ominous, another La Nina event, but again fortunately we lost very little time during the season. According to the Bureau of Meteorology we have another La Niña event this coming season.

Queensland Cricket were able to employ additional staff this year. Our thanks go to Lauren Atkinson and Michael Wright who saw us through a turbulent 2020/21 season. Alex Laube was appointed Premier Cricket Officer, Matthew Skinner to the role of State Umpire

Co-ordinator and Nick Stuart to Cricket Services Manager. We are looking forward to continuing our work with these gentlemen for the betterment of Cricket and the Association. Damien Mealey started the season as our State Coach. We congratulate Damien on his appointment as the Cricket Australia Umpire Chairman of Selectors. Congratulations also to Murray Branch for being appointed to the State Coaching role. David Staines was re-elected as the Representative Member and did an outstanding job providing communication between the Country Associations and the QCUSA.

With the redevelopment of Allan Border Field, we were unable to hold our regular meeting at Queensland Cricket. I would like to thank the Kedron-Wavell Services Club for assisting us in hosting both our Management and General Meetings at a substantially reduced cost. I am pleased to say our General Meetings will return to the Ian Healey Room for the upcoming season. Kedron-Wavell have kindly offered to host our Management Meetings at no cost for the upcoming season.

Some notable events took place throughout this season. Firstly, Ian Barsby and then Peter Boland reached the significant milestone of umpiring their 200th Two Day First Grade games. It is a testament of the commitment and dedication of both these gentlemen to reach this milestone. Donovan Koch was appointed to his first International Test Match. Donovan has also been elevated to the ICC Supplementary Panel. This is a great achievement. Whilst reaching these heights, with more to come, Donovan always makes himself available for our local competitions to train and mentor. David Taylor made his First Class debut this season. Just reward for effort and dedication. David is moving back to NSW and we wish him well in his Umpiring journey. Stephen Dionysius was appointed to the Men's U19 Final. Stephen

Dionysius has also been elevated to the CA Supplementary Panel for the coming season. We look forward to following Stephen's progression over the coming years. This season also saw our Umpires appointed to Sheffield Shield, One Day Competition, BBL, WBBL, 2nd XI and international tour matches.

Joshua Adie made his debut in the WBBL. Steven Farrell has decided to retire from umpiring from the end of this season. We thank Steven for his service to the Association and wish him all the best for the future. First Grade Umpire Ben Farrell was unable to officiate in our competitions due to Covid-19 travel restrictions. As a result, he stood in the NSW Premier Cricket Competition in Sydney where he was appointed to First Grade and then a Lower Grade Final; well done Ben. We look forward to you all returning to us in the coming season.

Thank you to our State Panel members who stepped into the breach when Covid disrupted travel throughout the States. You did yourselves and the Association proud.

The resurgence of Covid in our community will continue to present challenges. This season saw Mike Ralston and his team do an outstanding job of managing changes to appointments due to Cricket Australia bubbles and last-minute withdrawals due to illness. I cannot express my gratitude enough to these gentlemen.

After many years of service Mike Ralston has decided to retire and spend more time with family. The coming season will see Ian Barsby accept the role of Chairman of Selectors. He will be ably supported by Peter Monaghan, Don White, John Rowe and Jim Torpey. Thank you to those gentlemen for answering the call. It is a difficult and often thankless task. We could not field Umpires week in week out without the time and effort put in behind the scenes.

As in previous years recruitment and retention remains a major focus. This season Damien McAndrew has started our Junior Development Program. We have a number of promising members, with the indication of more coming on board in the coming year. It is vital we nurture these young Members to secure the future of the Association.

Nathan James continued in his role of Chairman of the Examination and Coaching Panel. Ross Howard also continued in the role of Training and Development Officer. They both did their roles with professionalism. Ross has announced he will not continue in the role for 2022/23. We thank Ross for his service.

The season's Annual Seminar was cancelled due to Covid. We look forward to being able to attend in the coming season's one in August, Covid restrictions allowing. This year has also seen the introduction of Winter Training sessions. These have been well attended, in person and online, with positive feedback from local and country attendees.

Captain's Reports have continued to be hit and miss. We are working with Queensland Cricket to see if some meaningful change is possible. It is important that Captains, and Club Officials, take these reports seriously. Honest

feedback can only assist in improving the understanding of Team's expectations of us as umpires.

This season has seen two of our umpires reported for breaching the Code of Conduct. I am pleased to advise that both reports found the umpires involved had no case to answer. It is worth considering that all participants are subject to Queensland Crickets Code of behaviour. If we treat each other with respect and be cool calm and collected in those tough moments it can only reinforce the standing of Umpires. We are there to facilitate the game and not be a 'Policeman'. However, if situation warrants, please ensure you report incidents as not doing so makes a rod for the back of those following you.

Your Management Committee this year was very different from recent years. The retirements of Peter Boland, Jim Griffith and Ron Johnsen provided opportunities to other members to take up the mantle of those that went before us. I would like to express our thanks to Peter, Jim and Ron for their selfless service to the Association. Thank you seems inadequate.

This year you saw fit to elect me as President, Stephen Dionysius as Vice President, Peter Hooper as

Treasurer, and Jeff Simmonds as a Member of your Management Committee. It has been a privilege to work with the Committee this year. Thank you to Stephen Dionysius, Peter Hooper, Murray White, Ross Howard, Damien McAndrew, Jeff Simmonds, Nathan James and Ian Barsby for the time and effort you have each put in.

After many years, in various roles, Ross Howard has informed us he will not stand for re-election this coming year. Ross your insights and contributions across a range of subjects has been insightful and valued.

The Associations financial position is strong. Negotiations are progressing to obtain a major sponsor for the 2023/24 season. This upcoming season is the last for our BLK contract. Your committee will be looking at options going forward. We thank BLK and Queensland Cricket for their support. We have supplied many of the Regional Associations with merchandise this year. This helps strengthen our relationships across the State as well as providing a uniform look for Umpires.

Our Annual Dinner was again held at Kedron Wavell Services Club. It was a well-attended night. Our guest speaker Kirby Short was informative and engaging. John Devine hosted the night. ## Life Membership



In recognising Damien McAndrew's devoted dedication and service to the Association, both on and off the field, he was awarded Life Membership at the 2021 Qld Cricket Umpires' and Scorers' Association's Annual General Meeting.

Damien McAndrew joined the Association in the 2005/06 season.

Unfortunately, in the same season another umpire whose name was Duane McAndrew also joined the Association. As you would expect having two new members with the name "D. McAndrew" caused a lot of confusion for quite a while. Most people thought they were brothers. However, fortunately they had totally different physiques. One was tall, slim and wore glasses and the other was short, stout and had 20/20 vision.

During that first season Damien only stood in a handful of games and we believe this was due mainly to work commitments. In fact, it wasn't until his fourth season in 2008/09 that he was able to commit to umpiring in earnest and that season's Third Grade Award.

His ability became evident from this and from these humble beginnings, he progressed to become a First-Grade badged umpire.

Following a year of personal tragedy about 11 years ago, Damien threw himself into helping the Association in every way he could and has continued to do so to this day. He has been on the Management Committee for 9 years, the Social Committee for 10 years, Property Officer for 7 years and Deputy Conducts officer for 6 years. His commitment to umpiring is shown by the number times he has been finalist for the Bob Spence Medal. He has done this now 11 times.

On many occasions he has gone out of his way to deliver shirts, hats, equipment and other umpire merchandise to umpires all over Brisbane so they would have everything they needed to stand in their games. He would drop items off to members houses and workplaces, meet them in car parks and all sorts of dodgy places. He would assist the Association with order quantities of items and suggested new items such as the backpacks and hat clips.



In addition, Damien was instrumental in researching the history of the Association to determine the correct First-Grade umpiring numbers that now appear on the First Grade Umpire's caps. He is currently researching all the other grades to determine how games that each umpire has stood in each grade. This is a massive job. He has also been working behind the scenes to try to get a Junior Academy of umpires off the ground and has always suggested ways to improve the Association and suggested ways to retain and recruit new umpires. He is always willing to go out of his way to help the Association and its members.

In 2015/16 Damien was awarded the Patrons award for his service to the Association. Since then, Damien has raised his level of commitment and dedication to even greater heights particularly through his umpire merchandise role, Association research, and recruitment initiatives in the years since then. In recognising Damien's devoted dedication, Damien was awarded Life Membership of the Qld Cricket Umpires' and Scorers' Association at the 2021 AGM.

# Membership



Membership saw a decrease in numbers this season. We have now 94 active members which is down from 99. The total membership of 111 includes 21 Life Members and a scorer. Seven life members, these being: Ian Barsby, Peter Boland, Ross Howard, Damien McAndrew, David McIver, Andrew Moir and Bruce Oxenford continue to be active umpires.

As has been the case in previous seasons, there are some members that only stand on the Sundays, however due to the ever-increasing demands of the competition this is welcomed particularly in the first half of the season. There are some who umpired five or less games during the season.

The average number of games umpired across the active membership was 20.16, an increase from 2021/22; this is from two factors: the active umpires had been available for more games during the season and also the ever-increasing number of games being scheduled by Queensland Cricket.

We had eleven new and returning members to the Association this season. As is the practice nowadays, these candidates completed before-hand the Community Officiating on-line course via the CA MyCricket Community website before they undertook the face-to-face sessions, attended the seminar and stood in the onfield sessions to complete their initial training. Thank you to Nelma who recruited some players from the Veteran's Cricket and also to Damien McAndrew who has established a Junior Academy to train and develop umpires that are under 18.

The feedback we have received from Ross Howard, Mike Ralston, the Observers and the clubs were incredibly positive about the abilities of many of our new members, so congratulations to all of them.

Thank you goes to Ross Howard, Damien McAndrew and all those who helped in welcoming and assisting with the new umpires during the season, your excellent contribution of time and effort, whether large or small, is greatly appreciated. Thank you to those on

the Examination and Coaching Panel who presented their sessions to assist the members during the season, whether they were in their first year or well past their thirtieth, I hope all got something out of the experience.

As has been the case for many seasons now, we needed to supply approximately 72 to 80 umpires per Saturday into Grade cricket. The numbers required for Sunday and night cricket is reflected in the ever-expanding Women's competitions which require more umpires than ever. Still however with the change in the competition structure, a small number of lower grade men's games were played on Sunday, usually Fifth or Sixth Grade.

As the season moved along, the availability of umpires started to drop off after Christmas and on a number of occasions there were shortages when the GPS season commenced and we couldn't supply that competition with many umpires on a regular basis.

With the ever-present Covid-19 Omicron variant situation, illnesses and work caused some late pull-outs with some last-minute reshuffling required. Mike Ralston, Peter Monaghan and John Rowe however did an excellent job with the allocations again this year under extremely trying circumstances.

## Umpiring Achievements

As Bruce Oxenford brought down the curtain on his international umpiring career at the Gabba last season, Donovan Koch was appointed to his First Test match as the Fourth Umpire in the Fifth Test in Hobart in January.

The 2021/22 season saw: Donovan Koch on CA's International Umpiring Panel, Bruce Oxenford on the National Panel and David Taylor was on the Supplementary Umpire Panel.

The 2021/22 State Panel umpires were: Joshua Adie, Stephen Dionysius, Steven Farrell, and Nathan James. All four on the panel had games in the BBL and/or WBBL and did the Association proud.

## Mel Johnson Medal

This medal is named in honour of our Life Member and Test Umpire Mel Johnson. It recognises members who show great promise in the early stages of their career and who have the potential to reach the elite level in umpiring.

Joshua Adie joined the Association in the 2014/15 as a new umpire. He took to umpiring like a duck to water and almost scooped up the Women's Award in his debut season. For his consistent umpiring and positive aptitude, he was awarded a Fifth Grade Semi-Final standing with Andrew Moir at Valleys.

He rose through the ranks and by 2016/17 he was a regular in Second Grade. During this time, he officiated in many off the mid-week and carnival games. The experience Josh picked up on these games, greatly assisted his early development.

Josh made his First-Grade Two-Day debut in November 2018 at Wests-Graceville with Donovan Koch as his partner for the game. A bit later that season, he was selected to go to the U19 Female National Championships in country Victoria around Ballarat and Bendigo.



That Championships, Victoria suffered under some record temperatures at the time, but Josh remained cool throughout. At the 50th Anniversary Dinner in 2019, he was awarded his 100 game badge.

The following season, in 2019/20, he was on the Development Panel and was umpiring regularly in First Grade. That season he was awarded his 150 game badge.

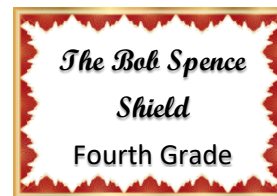

# Bob Spence Medal

# Umpire Selectors' Report



It is with much pleasure that I submit my report to the Association's Annual Report for the 2021/22 season outlining the good and difficult times faced by the Umpire Selection Committee.

The Panel consisted of myself, Mike Ralston (Chairman), Peter Monaghan, John Rowe and Don White who stepped into the role during the season. Early in the season, Damien Mealy, who initially had the role with Queensland Cricket as a liaison officer for Cricket Australia, moved away from the Association to accept the position of Chairman of the Cricket Australia Umpire Selection Committee.

The Queensland Cricket liaison officer position was filled by Murray Branch who was invited on several occasions to attend our selection meetings and gave invaluable input into the potential for several members to officiate in higher grades. Murray supported the Observation process with 65 observations for the season as well as his duties with the State and Development Panel. The Selection Committee maintained an excellent relationship with Murray.

The season was placed into turmoil on several occasions with the advent of the Covid 19 virus and inclement weather patterns throughout the season. The Panel met on 17 occasions throughout the season to appoint members to Premier Grade fixtures. These appointments were made more difficult by the isolation of many members due to Covid 19 positive tests for the virus thus requiring them to withdraw from fixtures. Several members were given the opportunity to officiate in Grades higher to what they were normally appointed too in the past, the Selection Committee was very pleased with this outcome as it brought

to light several umpires who accepted this challenge with gusto and performed to a high achievement level. The way these appointments were made identified the Associations depth of talent going forward into the future.

The heavy schedule of competitions developed by Queensland Cricket for the season played havoc with member availability mixed with Covid 19, work schedules, health issues and family commitments, all of these issues confronted the Selectors.

The panel reached out to our kindred Associations in the South East of the State for assistance and I am pleased to report that not one of our requests fell on deaf ears. My sincere appreciation was extended to Gympie, Sunshine Coast, Toowoomba, Ipswich, Boonah and the Gold Coast Associations for their support through difficult times. The QCUSA extended the same help to these Associations when they sort help from us.

Our dual role of Selectors and Observers took us too many areas of the Premier Grade competition for the season. We completed 179 Observations during the season with all members obtaining

two or three reports for the season. The overall feeling from the Observers was that the Association was in a very strong position to move forward into the future, this was echoed by several of the club management and Captains on field.

It became evident on some occasions when wet weather or bad light intervened during the days play those differences of opinion on playing regulations that issues arose, these issues were passed onto the coaching panel and were discussed at General Meetings and clarified. A big thank you to Nathan James and his team.

In conclusion, I would like to express my enormous appreciation to the many people who assisted the Selection Committee complete a difficult season of umpiring. Andrew Moir and his team on the Management Committee who always came through with support and guidance when issues arose. Murray White who was always at the end of the phone when called with support in various areas.

Nelma who introduced 4 veteran umpires to the Association to bolster our numbers. The new recruits performed admirably during their time with us and vowed to return next season. Queensland Cricket staff, Matthew Skinner, Grade Cricket Coordinator Alex Laube who went out of his way to communicate altered changes of match days, venue changes and times for match starts.

Finally, my team of Selectors and Observers who accepted late night calls and their patients, attention to detail and support during a difficult but enjoyable 2021/22 cricket season.

# Training and Development Officer's Report

After completing their on-line Community Officiating course there were two face to face training nights held in late July with a total of six prospective umpires in attendance. All in all, it was a disappointing start to the season in terms of new umpires. However early in the season Nelma Grout approached four mature gentlemen who were ex-players and were interested in putting something back into the game. Nelma trained them initially and then handed them over to me to polish them off. I would like to thank Nelma for her efforts in finding these umpires and the time she spent with them.

I would also like to thank Nathan James and Damien McAndrew who located a number of junior umpires

and trained them. I then stood with them in junior and carnival games and gave them some pointers. Both lads I stood with showed some promise with one in particular performing extremely well. Hopefully next season we can extend our development of younger umpires and attract more ex-players to our ranks.

I would like to congratulate Simon Bussey who won the Col Hoy Award. He showed great promise and commitment throughout the season. I am sure that if he sticks at umpiring, he has the ability to go a long way.

Finally, I would like to thank Murray White for his appointments of the new umpires to appropriate midweek games. I would also like to thank the Selection Panel for appointing the new umpires with experienced partners and in suitable grades. These umpires include Richard Rooke-Jones, Jim Griffith, Graham Wiggins, Brother Chris Pritchard and Nick Szkutko.

## Summary of Season

The 2021-22 season was another season of highlights, challenges, growth with some notable developments and initiatives commenced and to be initiated in the coming season.

The following delegates report includes key elements of the Queensland Cricket (QC) environment with focus on Elite Cricket, Infrastructure, Community Cricket, Premier Cricket, Financial and the Queensland Cricket strategy.

After what was a very challenging previous season in 2020/21, Qld Cricket have been able to deliver on the commitments made to the Qld Cricket Community.

### Highlights – Queensland Cricket Board

- The Qld Cricket Foundation launched recently held its first fundraising event, the Summer of Cricket Launch held at the Queensland Cricketers Club. Early indications suggest the event raised more than \$30K for the Foundation.
- The Future Fund has now been established with Morgan Stanley appointed to manage the Investment Fund. QC will invest \$3.5m into the fund, and Affiliates can invest with a minimum of \$100K.
- Grassroot Cricket Fund for FY22 has been established with \$100K in grants available in the first year. The initial focus will be based upon initiatives to grow participation.

- Infrastructure – The Australian Cricket Infrastructure Fund applications for FY22 closed in November 2021 with 43 applications with over half from regional areas. QC has reviewed and recommended 30 applications to the National Selection Panel.

### Financial Update

Queensland Cricket experienced testing conditions in our financial outlook for 2021-22 although the season proved ultimately rewarding.

COVID impacted us in areas such as BBL ticket sales and additional costs associated with the various restrictions that cricket had to operate under in terms of border closures and travel restrictions.

However, prudent budgeting and management of these costs enabled us to achieve a healthy balance

sheet and we will proceed with cautious optimism in spite of some ongoing national challenges.

It is anticipated that Qld Cricket will face a reduced level of CA funding in 2022-23; but QC affiliate funding remains unchanged and we aiming to deliver on our 2021-22 budget despite some headwinds.

- Current Financials indicate funding is currently stable and the forecast continues to achieve a \$500K surplus for the FY22.
- The first tranche of \$1.2m investment into the QC Future Fund is underway with further funds to be invested in February and May 2022.
- The AB Field redevelopment continues to proceed well although recent wet weather caused some delays to the project.

Fortunately, the support from our commercial partners was again outstanding, and we greatly appreciate the confidence they displayed in backing Queensland Cricket to the hilt once more.

There were strong numbers in WBBL and BBL broadcasting, while digitally the Heat remained a market-leader.

The Queensland Cricket Future Fund was established during the year, and we will continue to make selective investments to build further financial sustainability.

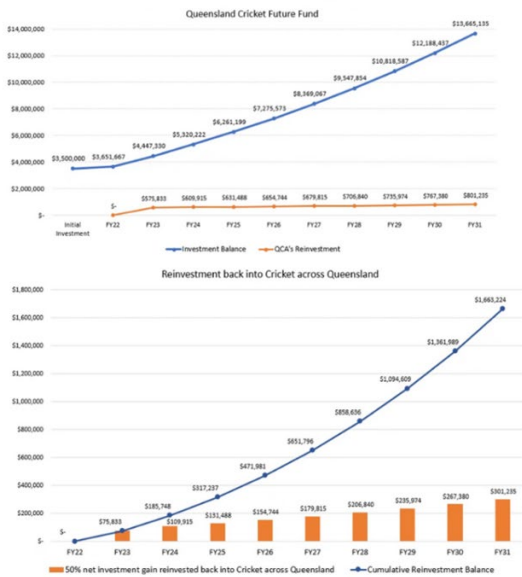

exceptional WT20 campaign in the ICC World Cup in New Zealand to win the trophy in comprehensive fashion.

Australia 'A' selection included six Queenslanders in the men's side that played the English Lions in a tour game at Ian Healy Oval in December, with Bryce Street, the only one of the six not to feature in a Test or in a national squad. He produced a determined 119 not out in the second innings to set-up an outright win for Australia.

Redmayne and Harris were joined by young guns Georgia Voll and Courtney Sippel in the Australia 'A' women's squad that defeated England 'A' 3-0 in an ODI series prior to the ICC T20 World Cup in New Zealand.

On the domestic front, a three-game winning streak by the Queensland Fire was not enough to see them make the WNCL final and defend the title they won for the first time last year.

However, there were several new faces who debuted for the Fire during the season in the absence of the Queensland players on national duty in New Zealand.

Players such as Grace Parsons, Lucy Hamilton, Caitlin Mair and Tara Wheeler will continue to develop from their experience this year.

It was a season of missed opportunities for the Bulls, finishing fifth in the Sheffield Shield and missing the One Day Final, after winning the Shield last season. Injuries and national representation tested the squad's depth and competitiveness.

Queensland played nine games, more than any other team due to border openings and closings and COVID lockdowns around the country.

The Bulls drew four matches, with one of its two wins coming in North Queensland at Townsville's Riverway Stadium in October. Mark Steketee and Matt Kuhnemann each claimed 10-wicket hauls in the season while the batters contributed nine centuries, one of which was scored by debutant Jack Clayton.

The 22-year-old left-hander became the first Bull since Sam Heazlett and Scott Henry to score a century on debut, with those milestones happening within a month of each in 2015, and the 20th overall to achieve the feat for Queensland.

Queensland also received further indications that the future is bright with the men's and women's U-19 teams winning their respective national championships in Mackay and Adelaide earlier this month and captains Noah McFadyen and Charli Knott named as their respective player of the tournament.

The men's tournament also featured a Queensland Country Under-19 side for the first time. While initially deemed a 'one-off' due to the decision of WA to withdraw from the tournament due to COVID travel concerns, Queensland Cricket will be a strong advocate to continue with the additional Maroons team in the future to deliver added incentive for regional players to aspire to higher honours.

It was also notable that the women's team had a strong regional presence, including Emerald pace bowler Bonnie Berry and Bundaberg-based Lucy Hamilton.

It is worth noting that regional centres hosted the highest level of elite cricket in a decade, including WBBL and International women's games in Mackay and Shield and One Day cricket in Townsville.

Queensland Cricket remains committed to growing the amount of elite level cricket in regional centres, with high hopes of meeting or exceeding expectations this year.

The decision to create a QC Grassroots fund was vindicated in the immediate aftermath of the 2022 floods, with \$100,000 additional funding brought forward to assist clubs and associations with flood recovery and a further \$20,000 added through a donation from The Lord's Taverners Qld.

The launch of the Queensland Cricket Foundation also enabled flexibility in fund-raising. There will be future fund-raising initiatives announced in the coming months that will enable the Foundation to grow and prosper as it delivers on its key pillars.

### Elite Cricket

There were some memorable moments on the field this year, even though team success was not realised.

Queensland enjoyed strong individual national representation, with 10 players chosen in Australian or Australia 'A' squads during the season.

Bulls captain Usman Khawaja returned to the Test arena, delivering outstanding results in the Ashes series and subsequent tour of Pakistan, alongside his Queensland teammate Marnus Labuschagne, rated the world's number one Test batsman by the ICC during this period.

Jess Jonassen, Beth Mooney, Grace Harris, and Georgia Redmayne were all members of the Australian Women's squad that completed an

The Ashes Test at the Gabba was an undoubted highlight, while additional international cricket was staged at Metricon Stadium on the Gold Coast featuring the Australian and Indian women's teams.

Finally, congratulations to Mark Steketee (Ian Healy Trophy) and Mikayla Hinkley (Fire Player of the Year) for their success at the recent QC Awards night.

### Infrastructure

Cricket in Queensland is set to see an expanded emphasis on infrastructure upgrades, new developments, and related projects for the remainder of 2022 and into 2023.

Major projects such as the forthcoming Gabba redevelopment and the redeveloped Allan Border Field and completion of the National Cricket Campus project are continuing or at the final stages of completion.

Despite the heavy rain in the early part of the year, the revamped Allan Border Field and Ray Lindwall Oval, were officially handed over on 14<sup>th</sup>

July with training expected to commence soon after that and matches to be held from August. Work is also underway at Norths to remediate areas of the Shaw Road facility after a busy 12 months while AB Field was off-line.

### Community Infrastructure & the Australian Cricket Infrastructure Fund (ACIF) Update

With flood recovery initiatives well underway, and a Federal Election campaign, community infrastructure developments have been favourably received.

The second round of ACIF has closed, with 40 applications currently under review totalling \$1m, which would be in addition to the \$800,000 already approved in the first round.

The total applications for 2021-22 are approximately 80, with QC estimating that more than 60 of these will be successful. This would represent a threefold increase from the previous year.

The recent Federal election has seen major investment commitments into several facilities including \$1.7m for Griffiths Park, Cairns.

Negotiations continue with Federal Government for election funding toward lighting and facilities for Souths Brisbane, Toombul, Redlands and Wynnum-Manly, with Souths and Wynnum both significantly affected by the floods.

Facilities and lighting upgrades continuing at several other venues including Bill Phippen Oval (Gold Coast), Sandgate Redcliffe net upgrade, Chelmer redevelopment, Valley redevelopment, Ipswich Hornets field lighting and Sunshine Coast's Scorchers new future home fields at Honeywell Rd, Caloundra.



Queensland Cricket will also commence its State-wide Facilities audit this month.

### Community Cricket

Despite the twin tests of COVID and the 2022 floods, Queensland has recorded a three percent rise in growth across Junior Cricket and Woolworths Cricket Blast this season.

This is the largest growth from States across the country and a welcome result for the hard-working volunteer base that has helped produce such a rewarding outcome.

It means Queensland has produced 13% growth over the past two years. The annual Australian Cricket Census process has commenced, and we look forward to receiving more data and insights from this process soon.

Other highlights include the growth of Social Women's competitions, with four launched in the season. These include Townsville (four teams), Toowoomba (two teams) and Rockhampton (five teams).

There was also the return from COVID-enforced absences of the Goldfield Ashes and Canefield Ashes social cricket events, featuring more than 450 teams, and the return of the Veterans' Cricket annual Cooper-Findlay Trophy series between Queensland and NSW.

Community Indigenous competitions, Rainforest Cup and Western Rivers Cup, will also make their return in 2022/23.

In the metropolitan area, Warehouse and Sub-Districts Cricket teams featured in strong Community Cricket championship for the first time.

At a representative level, QC ensured opportunities for men's and women's Queensland Country and Queensland Indigenous men's and women's teams.

The Brahmans were undefeated in their men's competition while the Brolgas were competitive in their female series against NSW, ACT and Papua New Guinea. Weather unfortunately disrupted the Men's Indigenous team at Coffs Harbour but there were sound training and development outcomes for the players.

### First Nations Initiatives

A key initiative for Queensland Cricket and our First Nations Advisory Committee is to develop and implement a Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP).

The First Nation Advisory Committee, co-chaired by Terry Svenson and Jason Smith, has endorsed a proposal from KPMG to facilitate this important program.

Chief Operating Officer Liam Hibbert and the People and Culture team will take the lead in this process for QC, reporting into the First Nations Advisory Council and QC Board.

We anticipate making significant progress in this initiative by NAIDOC week in early July.

Queensland Cricket was pleased to engage with Fire and WBBL Brisbane Heat player Mikayla Hinkley who will also play a role in the development of the RAP.

### Premier Cricket

Premier Cricket competitions around the State continue to play important roles in the health and strength of the game.

In the KFC Queensland Premier Grade Cricket competition, Western Suburbs won the Men's two-day Sci-Fleet Motors competition and Gold Coast took out the Kookaburra One Day and T20 titles. Valley won the one-day Katherine Raymont title while Sunshine Coast made it two

trophies in their first two seasons with victory in the T20 competition.

Other winners in the Premier Competition were University (Second Grade), Redlands (Third Grade), Norths (Fourth Grade), Toombul (Fifth Grade), and Redlands (Sixth Grade).

There were seven men's and seven women's Premier Grade matches streamed on KAYO this summer, with Queensland the first State to have women's first grade games shown on that platform.

The Gabba hosted the men's Kookaburra T20 Final, as it did with the decider of the Bulls Masters Country Challenge T20 competition.

The women's T20 Final was held under lights at Ian Healy Oval.

### Premier Cricket T20 Competition

A refreshed men's Premier Cricket T20 Competition will be held featuring all twelve clubs between 18 August – 4 September with the final being played at Allan Border Field under lights.

The purpose of the T20 Max Cricket competition is to give players more opportunities to compete (and strengthen skills) in this format which may lead to a Brisbane Heat contract. Clubs will be given the opportunities to attract interstate and regional/country players for the competition.

The competition will be livestreamed, and we anticipate selected games will be on Kayo (with commentary).

Elsewhere, Queensland Cricket's Curatorial Assistance Program has also commenced with wicket block and playing surface remediation and improvement over winter.

### Strategic Plan

Over the past six months Queensland Cricket has been working with Cricket Australia, QC staff, government, affiliates, and the cricketing community to develop the next Queensland Cricket Strategy.

The draft strategy has been completed and reviewed by the Board with operational plans,

budgets and resourcing being developed currently.

The Board has led the Strategy Renewal process and agreed the renewed Vision, Purpose and Values as:

*Vision* - To be Queensland's leading sport

*Purpose* - To promote and grow cricket ensuring all Queenslanders can play, participate and enjoy the game

*Values* - We are Queensland Cricket

*We care* for our people; our communities and we are passionate about supporting Queenslanders to play cricket

We lead with integrity and honesty within our communities

*We deliver* on and off the field, always striving to do our best.

*We innovate*, create and collaboratively solve problems

1. Sustainable Participation growth
2. Better Teams, Players and Coaches

Joining me on the committee for 2021/22 season was Bennett King [Chair], John Salter, Dan Maroske, Nick Hurford, Tess Cooper, Kirby Short, and Alex Laube.

The COVID19 threat was the biggest issue confronting the competition and clubs and administrators were informed of Cricket Australia's Responses and advice, with that in mind, the committee had their first meeting in August to discuss and formulate plans for the coming season.

The Premier Cricket Committee strategy is to enhance and promote the States Leading Cricket Competition through participation growth, quality wickets and outfields, sustainable clubs and media and promotion awareness.

Competition Highlights for the season.

1- Kayo Sport agreement to broadcast selected Men's and Women's First grade matches.

- 2- Frogbox live streams ALL First Grade Qld Premier matches and even some lower grade matches.
- 3- Media following is up approximately 25%, namely Facebook and Instagram.
- 4- "That's Stumps with Leigh Drennan" was well received by the Cricket Community.
- 5- Playing the Men's Twenty20 First Grade Final at the Gabba as a curtain raiser to BBL on 19th December. This was the first time since 2006/07 season a Premier Cricket match was hosted there.
- 6- Playing a Day/Night Men's First Grade semi-final One Day competition at Ian Healy Oval.
- 7- Playing Women's First Grade Twenty20 final at Healy Oval under lights.
- 8- Introduction of Kirby Short Shield, an Under 19 Women's competition.
- 9- Reintroduce the Lord Taverners Twenty20 competition played in the September school holidays, 10 clubs participated.

Whilst there are a number of further highlights during the season, the committee was kept busy with clubs requesting eligibility of players for final series and dispute resolution.

Although there was some disruption throughout the season, and thanks to the clubs, administrators, players and officials, the season was completed with the Grand Finals being played in all the grades unlike the previous season. Congratulations to all victors.

The Premier Grade Cricket Dinner was held at the Gabba. Harrison Wood won the Peter Burge Medal. Ruby Strange and Tara Wheeler shared the honours for Kath Smith Medal; congratulations to all.

I would like to thank all my fellow umpires who made themselves available to cover the myriad of games throughout the season and congratulations to all who were selected in the finals' series, a fitting reward for a good season.

I wish to thank Nick Stuart and Alex Laube for all their hard work behind the scenes and congratulate them both on a job well done.

Finally, best wishes to all members. I look forward to seeing you back refreshed for the 2022/23 season, which will be huge!!!

# State Umpire Coordinator's Report



## Season Review – 2021-22 Season

This season saw me step into the Umpire Coordinator role two weeks prior to the start of the season, which made for a steep learning curve to navigate the logistics of running the State umpiring program with the season getting up and running. With the support of the QCUSA Management Committee and QC staff, I was able to get up to speed quickly and we are now in a good position coming into the 2022-23 season.

Mike Ralston chaired the Selection Committee and oversaw the observers for the 2021-22 season, with Murray Branch, Peter Monaghan, John Rowe and Don White ably assisting him throughout the year. There were various challenges thrown at this group throughout the season, however they managed to ensure that all Premier Cricket matches were covered.

The number of new members was lower than previous years and this will be a key focus point to ensure that we can both continue to cover the amount of cricket being played and develop umpires for the future.

Damien Mealey was appointed as the Chair of Selection Committee for Cricket Australia, and as such, Murray Branch was brought on to fill the QC State Umpire Coach role. Murray has acquitted himself well this season, with a Development Panel being announced and showing promise in their appointments thus far. In conjunction with Damien McAndrew's efforts to develop junior umpires there is much work to be done, however the future of the Association's umpiring stocks is in good hands.

Queensland Cricket continues to work with QCUSA and the many Umpire Associations to staff the various carnivals and tournaments that are run during the year, providing development opportunities to both umpires and players alike.

A whole-of-State umpire survey was completed in April 2022, with over 140 respondents from across Queensland providing their feedback on their umpiring experiences. The data provided has been insightful and will assist us with our future directions.

### Milestones Achieved

The past season saw two QCUSA stalwarts achieve the milestone of their 200th First Grade 2-Day match, with Ian Barsby standing in his 200th at Redlands in October 2021, and then Peter Boland in January 2022 at University in their clash against Valley.

These two gentlemen have served our Premier Cricket Competition well, and we look forward to seeing them continue to serve in the future.

### Representative Appointments

In a summer interrupted by COVID and lockdowns, Queensland umpires continued to receive a large number of appointments in the National sphere, with Bruce Oxenford, Donovan Koch, David Taylor, Stephen Dionysius, Steven Farrell, Nathan James and Joshua Adie all representing the State on various National and International stages.

Donovan Koch was appointed to the International Umpire Panel in June 2021 and was subsequently appointed to the Hobart Ashes Test as Fourth Umpire in January 2022. Donovan followed this up with appointments to the Dettol T20 International Series between Australia and Sri Lanka in February 2022.

Bruce Oxenford was appointed to both the International Women's Series between Australia and India in September & October 2021 and the Australia v England Women's Ashes Series in January & February 2022, serving in both on-field and Third & Fourth umpire roles during these matches.



David Taylor made his Sheffield Shield debut, standing in the South Australia v Victoria clash in February 2022 with Greg Davidson, and was a regular fixture in both the WBBL and BBL competitions through the summer.

These three umpires also played a major part in the BBL competition, with 42 appointments between them – Taylor 17, Oxenford 15 and Koch 10.

Within the State Umpire Panel, both Stephen Dionysius and Steven Farrell were regularly on the ground, standing in BBL, WBBL, Second XI and WNCL matches throughout the summer. Both Dionysius and Farrell were then appointed to the Under 19 Male National Championships in Mackay, with Dionysius being appointed to the Final with Sharad Patel, and Farrell appointed to the 3rd v 4th match with Drew Crozier.

Stephen Dionysius was rewarded for his performance with elevation to the CA Supplementary Umpire Panel for the 2022/23 season.

Nathan James and Joshua Adie rounded out the State Umpire Panel with three appointments each to WBBL matches in Mackay, whilst Joshua was also appointed to the Under 19 Female National Championships in Adelaide in April 2022.

A summary table of Cricket Australia appointments is provided at the end of this report. A full game breakdown of these appointments is tabled later in the QCUSA Annual Report.



## Training and Development

Nathan James took charge of monthly Training and Development in the QCUSA meetings and has been a great coordinator and presenter of the Winter Training Sessions this off-season. Working in conjunction with myself and State Umpire Coach Murray Branch, we will have further education options available to both QCUSA members and umpires across Queensland to extend their knowledge over the coming months.

In addition to the work undertaken by the QCUSA, a total of 26 Umpire Education courses were run over the course of 2021/22, with 138 participants from across

Queensland. The course locations ranged from Cairns through to Chinchilla, with a growing number of courses being run online through Microsoft Teams to allow for participation from remote areas as well. Whilst this number includes 104 Community Grade umpires, this number needs to rise significantly as the number of cricket matches played grows, both in Brisbane and across Queensland.

SEQ Regional Umpire Coordinator David Staines was instrumental in running the two Representative Grade Umpire courses – one face-to-face in Brisbane and the other online via MS Teams. This enabled 34 participants to complete their Representative Face-to-Face and continue to grow their umpiring knowledge.

Whilst the QCUSA Pre-Season seminar was cancelled due to COVID restrictions, seminars were run in Cairns, Townsville, Wide Bay, Sunshine Coast, Gold Coast and Toowoomba prior to the 21-22 season, with over 70

umpires participating. Whilst the COVID bug also saw the Rockhampton and Mackay seminars cancelled, plans are well afoot to run seminars across each of the regions in the coming months prior to the 2022/23 season.

## In Conclusion

Firstly, thank you to all the QCUSA members who have welcomed me to the role this season. It has been a steep learning curve which I have enjoyed immensely!

We now look forward to the 2022/23 season and a focus on increasing both the quantity of accredited umpires across Brisbane and Queensland, as well as providing more educational opportunities for us to develop.

There are many challenges that face the umpiring fraternity in today's society, but I know that with the strength of our membership and the resolve to grow that we will be able to meet these challenges head on.

## U19 Male Championships Report



The U19 Male Championships returned after a two-year spell due to Covid and was held in Mackay April 2022. The teams were made up of Qld Metro and Qld Country, NSW Metro and U17 NSW Metro, ACT, Vic Metro and Vic Country, Northern Territory, South Australia, and Tasmania. Absent was Western Australia who withdrew their side citing concerns about quarantine for teenagers.

After a busy summer, holding this championship was going to challenge not only the players, but officials, scorers and ground staff particularly being held in North Qld in a moderately wet season. The focus was always going to be around managing Covid-19 protocols, being responsible and safe but maximise play as best we could.

Cricket Australia continued this season's championship with nine umpires from around Australia and one National Panel Umpire in Phil Gillespie in the capacity of Umpire/Mentor. A total of three

match referees and John Ward as CA Coach and Chairman of Selectors in Damien Mealey. Representing Queensland was Steve Farrell, David Taylor who was called as a replacement due to a colleague falling ill with Covid and myself, Steve Dionysius as umpires with Kepler Wessels as match referee.

On arrival, we checked into our hotel and the scene was set at the grounds Harrop Park (four in total) with another 25 mins away. Cricket was the focus, and the challenge was now to find the extra 20% to provide the game with quality decisions and management of the championships.

# Peter Burge Medal



The Peter Burge Medal is awarded each season to the best and fairest cricketer in the Bulls Masters First Grade Competition, as judged by the Premier Grade umpires.

The award is named in honour of Peter Burge, widely regarded as one of Queensland's finest home-grown batsman. Burge excelled in a 15-year Sheffield Shield career, scoring 7,627 runs at an average of 56.08, including 24 centuries. He played in 91 first class matches for Queensland and captained the side on 29 occasions.

Burge also played 42 Test matches for Australia, scoring 2,290 runs at 38.16, including four centuries. His first-class career spanned from 1952/53-1967/68, where Burge played some 233 matches at an average of 47.53 including 38 centuries. His highest first-class score was 283 which is the second highest score by a Queenslanders in Sheffield Shield/Pura Cup cricket. In 2000 he was named in the Queensland Cricket Team of the Century.



This year's winner was allrounder Harry Wood, who became the first winner from Cricket Ipswich, with a sweeping victory that saw him poll points in most matches across the season as the Hornets claimed the Damien Mullins Cup as minor premiers.

The 23-year-old Laidley product, whose older brother Jack is a Queensland Bulls contracted player, proved a match winner with bat and ball during the season, which saw the Hornets fall at the final hurdle in the Sci-Fleet Motors First Grade final which was won by Western Suburbs.

It was a family celebration for the Wood clan with his father Peter also celebrating an Over-40s premiership for Ipswich.

Wood, who is a former Australian Under-19 representative, scored 932 runs at 51.80 from 22 games as well as taking 23 wickets at 23.30

# Kath Smith Medal



The Kath Smith Medal is awarded each season to the best and fairest women's cricketer playing in Queensland Premier Grade Competition known as the Katherine Raymont Shield and sponsored by Konica-Minolta, as judged by the umpires. Konica Minolta has supported women's cricket in Queensland now for over 25 years, one of the longest sports sponsorships in Australian history.

The award is named in honour of Kath Smith, a right-hand batter and left-arm pace bowler who debuted for Queensland when she was just 14. She played six Tests for Australia in the 1930s and was vice-captain of the Australian team that played the very first women's Test against England at the Brisbane Exhibition Ground in December 1934 and for the two subsequent Test matches played during January 1935 in Sydney and Melbourne. In the 1937 tour to England, the all-rounder's top score of 88 and bowling figures of 4-50 inspired Australia's first ever Women's Test victory over England.

There was a tie for the first time in the Kath Smith Medal, with Gold Coast opening batter and part-time leg spinner Tara Wheeler and University of Queensland allrounder Ruby Strange unable to be split on 39 points each. Ruby's teammate at UQ, Charli Knott, was a close third only 1 point behind after the votes were tallied.

This is Tara's had a break-out season scoring 813 runs at an average of 34 including a top score of 103 and 18 wickets at 25. She made her Queensland Fire debut with the Women's National Cricket League on 6<sup>th</sup> March at North Sydney Oval.

She has been in the Queensland Cricket Junior programs from the Under 12s all the way up to the Under 18s and represented Queensland in both the 15s and 18s. Her improving talents were recognised by being selected in the Queensland Premier Cricket team of the 2019/20 season.



Ruby Strange was a member of the Queensland Under-19 team that won the National championships in Adelaide in April. Like Tara, Ruby has represented Queensland in the junior program and represented Capricornia in the regional championships.

Ruby, who hails from Gladstone, along with the Kath Smith Medal, won the Loretta Moore Trophy (that is named after Queensland Cricket's first female Life Member) as the most improved Under-21 player in the Katherine Raymont Shield. She also won the KFC moment of the year.

Both Tara and Ruby were named in the Katherine Raymont Shield Team of the Year for 2021/22.

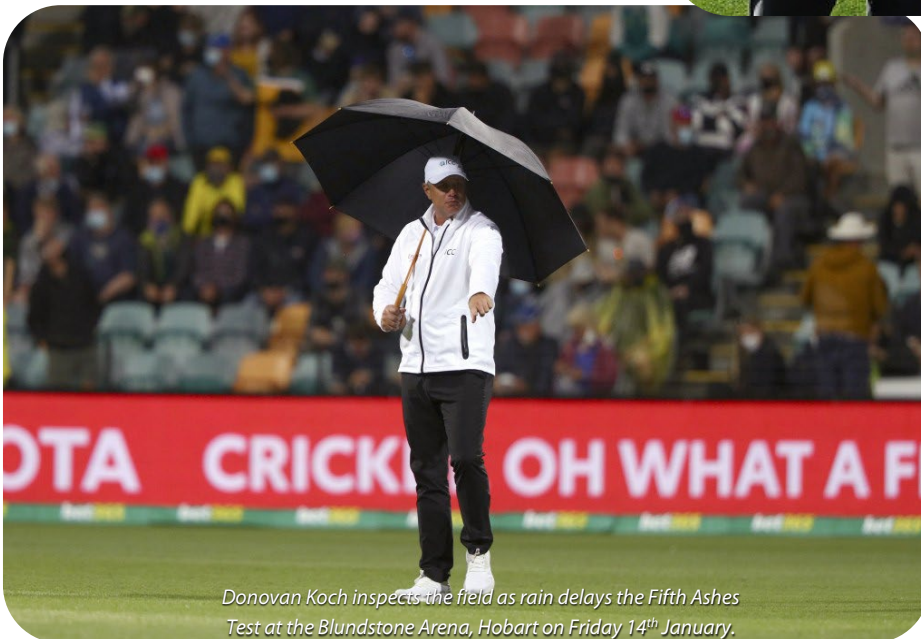
