In June we advised you that Cricket Australia was seeking a vendor to help us transition from the current Alinta Energy MyCricket System ('MyCricket') to a new registration and competition management platform.

After reviewing applications from leading vendors around the globe, I am delighted to inform you we have



engaged in a long-term partnership with PlayHQ as the new provider of our core digital services to the Australian cricket community.

PlayHQ is a Melbourne-based start-up. The company is building a new cloudbased platform for grassroots sport and has formed partnerships with other National and State sporting bodies, such as Basketball Victoria and most recently the AFL, to help meet the same challenges you face as volunteers.

After a three-month 'discovery' process, we are confident that PlayHQ is the right partner for community cricket and can play a central role in enhancing the digital services we provide and ease the workload of volunteers.

Cricket umpiring in North Queensland

I made my cricket debut at Townsville's Endeavour #1 ground in September 1975 in a very inauspicious Reserve Grade performance for University, a performance that was to become all too familiar over the rest of my brief playing career. On that day, my fellow debutants were Ashley Moller (that supremely talented Gordonvale product on whom I reckon David Gower based his languid technique!!!) and David Peever (future CEO of Rio Tinto and Chairman of the Cricket Australia Board). Not surprisingly they left me in their wakes to inexorably forge their way to much bigger and better cricket achievements. So, when I strode out onto the same ground in 2014 as brand-new umpire a little voice in my ear said: "let's try this again!"

It was, indeed, a better choice. In umpiring I, like many of the readers of this article, found a different, exciting connection with the game, allowing me to participate and yet to give back. I am proud to be a cricket umpire.

The North Queensland Cricket Association Zone runs from the Coral Sea coast, west to Mt Isa and the Qld border and is bounded to its north from our friends from Cricket Far North at Cardwell and to the south from our friends at Mackay-Whitsunday somewhere (nobody ever seems to know where) between Home Hill and Bowen. Whereas there is an obvious cricket focus on Townsville as the largest tropical city in the country, there are proud and established cricket communities in the sugar cane fields of the Burdekin and Herbert River areas, the historic mining centre of Charters Towers and contemporary mining centre of Mt Isa. I could talk at length about famous and perhaps infamous cricketers from these parts but to spare readers from my lack of literary prowess I can but recommend you plough through the pages of "Bradmans of the Bush" by Piesse and Wilson - perhaps the best cricket read in this country.

Formal cricket umpiring in North Queensland is centred on Townsville, but can include umpires anywhere in the Zone if they wish, through the auspices of the Townsville Cricket Umpires Association (TCUA). The TCUA established itself as a separate entity from Townsville Cricket Inc. in the 2009/10 season but still maintains a strong link with the administrators of cricket in Townsville through its membership of Townsville Cricket Inc. (TCI). TCUA members only half-jokingly boast that they may well be the smallest incorporated body in Australia with an active membership of 16 when all are fit! But what is lacking in numbers is made up for in enthusiasm for the game. The average age of an umpire in these parts hovers around 50 with experience levels measured from months to decades. TCUA membership includes one (they hope to make it more) female umpire. TCUA umpire fees are roughly comparable with our friends in CFN as mentioned by Julian Warnock in the September edition of **Black and Blue**, however, TCUA doesn't need to apply a travel component.

There are 7 clubs in Townsville Cricket fielding 22 teams across a new structure of A, B and C Grades (replacing the old A-Grade, Reserves, 3rds and 4ths). A-Grade (expanding to both 2-and 1-day cricket in the 2nd half of the season) plays on Saturdays although this season's draw will introduce some A-Grade games on Sunday with B and C Grades playing only on Sundays. A-Grade 1-day games are 45 overs per side, B Grade is 40 overs and C Grade is 30 overs. A T20 competition is also incorporated into the season. This new arrangement will present a challenge for TCUA to field umpires across all games on both days this season. A-Grade is, as far as practicable, served by 2 umpires per game - providing umpires to two A-Grade games on Saturdays should present no trouble for our erstwhile Allocations Officer. However, having an A-Grade game on the same day as potentially nine games on Sunday in B and C Grades will stretch TCUA umpiring resources very thin indeed! It is welcoming to see Charters Towers fielding an additional, competitive team, in the B Grade. It is even more welcoming to note that TCUA now has a fully accredited umpire in Charters Towers to stand in the Charters Towers B Grade team's home games.

Credit is due to TCI for learning some quick COVID-19 lessons through a preseason T20 "Winter Whack" which allowed the regular season to commence in late September. Along with the usual social distancing requirements (yes, we know they are a bit dodgy to implement at the fall of a wicket) players and match officials have reasonably quickly adapted to ball cleansing at drinks and placing bowlers hats on the ground as exercises in playing their part to ensure that this cricket season, from park cricket to the Test Match arena, isn't jeopardised by a COVID cluster developing somewhere from a game of cricket!!

All TCUA umpires have, at least, attained their Cricket Australia 'Community Umpiring' level with nine of their number also attaining 'Representative' accreditation. This season has also seen the resumption of regular (we hope) umpire training evenings where the emphasis will be on field craft as well as the Laws with a strategy that "we will all pitch in to help each other". It is intended that this more collegiate approach will be more effective than a 'teacher/student' situation. The concept of mentoring regional umpires with Brisbane counterparts is something that has peeked interest within TCUA as has



the possibility of experienced representative umpires from Qld and interstate assisting in training TCUA members either remotely (in these COVID-19, cash poor times) or, if at all possible, in person. These opportunities will be explored further as we all seek to better ourselves as park umpires or representative umpires, whichever we strive to be. Should any readers be contemplating relocating to the NQ region, please contact either me directly or TCUA at the contact details listed here. Wherever you may find yourself in our Zone, should you wish to continue or, indeed, commence your umpiring career you will be sure to find a welcoming hand!

All the best to you all wherever you are, stay safe and: may they all snick off to slip!
