



ROBERT SPENCE

Robert Spence, our Patron of twenty-five years passed away in February 1997 after a long illness. Bob, as he was known to us, was involved in our Association from its inception as our honorary auditor and remained in this position until illness prevented him continuing.

Bob was always interested in the operations of the Association and in the progress made by our leading umpires. Bob held many positions over the years in Queensland Cricket and the Cricketers' Club and was awarded Life Membership of both Associations. He was a First Class Scorer, Treasurer of Queensland Cricket, Chairman of the Brisbane Grade Committee to name just a few.

In recognition of his support for our Association, our major Award for Umpiring Achievement was named after him.

Robert Spence will be sadly missed by our Association and by the cricket fraternity at large.

WILLIAM EDWARD PENDER (WEP) HARRIS

While Queensland was winning its second Sheffield Shield Final (in March 1997), all the cricket family was attending Wep Harrls's funeral.

Wep (Mr. University) held the position of Secretary of University Cricket Club from February 1958 until his death and was the backbone of the club holding the positions of Delegate to Queensland Cricket, member of the Grade Committee, First Grade Manager and Scorer and Groundsman.

He was not only involved in the University Club but was very active within Queensland Cricket and the Cricketers' Club. His services within these Associations were recognised by Life Membership being awarded to him.

Wep was a friend and supporter of all umpires and was highly regarded within our Association. He always attended our annual dinners and was happy to present awards. Wep's name will continue in our Association with the First Grade Award being named after him.

Wep Harris, a gentleman and a character will long be remembered by all who knew him.

DAESIDENT'S AEPOAT

Many seasons ago, the QCUA embarked on a number of measures which it was believed would improve the situation of umpiring cricket. All the goals have been met, and the eternal struggle to have the best umpires is as close to being reached as possible, with Association averages higher than previous results.

Appointments used be done each round by a committee which comprised mainly of well-meaning officials and an umpires' representative. Few on the committee had detailed knowledge of the umpires they were appointing. A wise decision was taken to have the umpires' association make its own appointments. From this time on, progress has been onwards and upwards.

it was in recent memory that cricket administrators wanted the QCUA to abandon its policy of umpiring only in pairs and to return to umpiring alone. They were quite rightly concerned that many grades were without umpires on a rotational basis. Nevertheless the policy was adhered to, and with the help of good advertising campaigns, a retirement scheme and the fine work of a few dedicated personnel, season 96/97 saw an abundance of umpires, even overflowing into the Sub-District Competition.

From a situation where one person might see you in your first match, the observer corps has been enlarged to three. Even with this number of observers, it is difficult to see umpires as often as would be ideal. The Association is looking to utilise video tape to assist all umpires in the near future, and not merely those who have the opportunity to umpire a televised match. The purchase of good quality equipment has been a task of the off-season and i have no doubt that being able to see oneself in action will bring even greater improvements to Queensland umpiring.

There will always be criticism of umpires and of decisions - one does not go into umpiring with the expectation that all decisions will be thought correct by all. It gave me great joy however, to learn that the marks given by captains to umpires in the recently completed season had improved from those of earlier seasons. Recruitment and development officers of recent seasons must be given high praise for this, and the Examination and Coaching Panel may also take heart. The figures do also make it harder to do what must now be done and that is to strive to show further improvement. The Board of Examination and Coaching has a responsibility to prepare well for seminars and meeting nights, so that they present umpires with a wide variety of approaches to improving their umpiring skills and knowledge of the laws, and maintain interest in doing so. The Association result is one for cautious pride and future challenge.

For many years now, the QCUA has had a fine, close working relationship with Queensland Cricket. The level of cooperation, understanding and trust that has developed has been a significant factor in the many successes in umpiring. Long time Secretary, Nelma Grout has been a prime mover in maintaining this good working relationship and has been a marvellous and constant worker for the Association. Much of the credit for success must go to her.

The QCUA has met the challenges of the past with great success. It is time to issue new challenges as changes occur in the way the game is to be played. We must strive to reach new heights in our standards on and off the field, and to maintain the excellent reputation that the Association thoroughly deserves. It has been a privilege to preside over the Association in such a healthy state.

The main items of business handled by the Executive Committee are as follows;

Meeting with National Umpiring Manager

The Executive Committee was happy to meet with Tony Crafter in November where he outlined plans for First Class umpires in the 1996/97 season. He also sought our views on the future recruitment of umpires and what assistance the ACB could provide with advertising campaigns.

The Association is please to note that the ACB is placing greater emphasis on the recruitment and training of umpiring.

ACB Training Video

In September 1996, two of our members Alan Loynes and Kev Horton along with Mel Johnson were involved in the production of the first ACB video on the Laws of Cricket. To give assistance to country Associations with their training of umpires, a copy has been sent to each of the Zone Delegates. Further copies are available for interested parties to purchase.

ACB Accreditation

During the season an effort was made to ensure that all active members had passed the ACB Level 2 exam by the completion of the 1996/97 season.

Captain's Reports

At the request of members, a new Captain's report was designed for the 1996/97 season on a one season trial basis. The report was quite successful but next season, captains will be asked to jointly complete the reports.

Wep Harris Testimonial Dinner

Our Association sponsored a table at this function which was held on the 22nd November 1996, at the Crest Hotel. It was wonderful to see in excess of 300 people acknowledge the commitment that Wep has made to Queensland Cricket.

First Grade Award

In honour of Wep Harris who recently passed away, the Association has decided to name the First Grade Award - The Wep Harris Memorial Award.

Honour Board

After many years of not having a home, the Honour Board will soon hang in the Meeting Room of Queensland Cricket Headquarters.

Umpire Recruitment

The Executive Committee still believe that we recruit new members each season. To that end advertisements were placed in both the Courier and Sunday Mail.

To assist in the recruitment of umpires in country areas, contact numbers of zone delegates were included in the Sunday Mail advertisements.

Constitution Changes

A special general meeting was held in July to amend the Constitution where it pertained to the Board of Examination and Coaching so that this Committee became an appointed rather than elected one.

Member's Benefits - Some of the benefits the Association provided for its members were:

- A reply paid permit for members to use when returning their captain's reports to the Secretary.
- Stamped addressed envelopes were issued to First Grade umpires for the return of their Peter Burge Medal forms to Queensland Cricket.
- All members received a covered notebook for umpiring use.

Meeting with new CEO

The President and Secretary met with Graham Dixon in the off season to discuss matters of mutual concern to Queensland Cricket and our Association.

The Executive Committee is pleased with its achievements during the past year and would consider 1996/97 a very successful year.



With twenty-nine new members, total membership rose to a record one hundred and six which includes our twelve life members. It is pleasing to report that not only was it a very successful year with our largest intake of new members, there were only seventeen members who did not renew their membership.

TROOPS DAIRING TO BODD THE

As mentioned elsewhere in the Annual Report, the ACB has placed great emphasis on nationally raising the standard of examination and coaching. A big thank you to all those people in the country and metropolitan zones for the very competent way you have embraced the ACB's goals. Seminars followed by examinations are being conducted in all zones and, in many cases by local Associations. Having successfully completed step one, the ACB is looking at ways they can "train the trainer" and also "ticket" candidates who sit for the National exam in the four levels.

To this end, a video has been produced by the ACB for the training of umpires. Each zone will be given one copy and forthcoming country seminars will be used to "walk" the trainers through this exciting development in training umpires. QCCA seminars will be held in Townsville, Maryborough, and Toowoomba and appreciation is extended to Garry Madsen and Eric Adams for their part in facilitating these projects. Along with Queensland Cricket, the QCCA enabled a very important follow-up meeting to be held in Brisbane Involving local cricket Associations and local Umpires' Associations. With one exception the fruits of these meetings have already been borne.

Country umpires now strive to represent their zone on the ten man country panel, six of whom were chosen to officiate in the prestigious National Country Cricket Championships held in Toowoomba. Indeed the career path is now open for all country umpires to officiate at the very highest level.

The ACB Umpiring Manager is in constant contact with the State Directors regarding a whole range of subjects from advice in selection of Test umpires to how will this recommendation be received in Oodnadatta. The opening of these communication channels has greatly improved umpiring both on and off the field.

For me to complete the tasks set by the ACB, the whole network must work and I am very appreciative of the support given by the ACB, Queensland Cricket, QCCA, QCUA, the Country Representatives, Zone Co-ordinators and local Umpire Associations in those zones. You people have made a great contribution to umpiring.

The 1996/97 season saw the Australian Cricket Board Instigate a National advertising campaign for umpires for the first time. This campaign was a great success in Queensland and, along with our own advertising, it was instrumental in a total of 28 new members being recruited into our Association.

The training of the new recruits was Initially conducted by our inaugural Recruitment and Development Officer, Mr Col Bertwistle, with assistance from Ray isherwood, Tony McQuillan, Michael Jav and myself.

CRADE ALLOCATION PANEL REPORT

Following an ACB initiative in advertising for umpires, the Allocation Panel had the task of placing an excess of umpires. As figures below will indicate the Allocation Panel placed record numbers of umpires and this is in no small way attributed to fellow members of the panel who worked so professionally.

During 1996/97, 91 umpires (which includes two umpires who only officiated on Sundays) were appointed to Queensland Cricket Grade Competition matches. The number required for a full compliment is 64, therefore it is no longer appropriate to show the number of umpires who officiated in each round as we had excess in every round. Excess umpires were appointed to Sub-District games. Whenever possible, First Grade umpires were rotated to lower grades to assist newer members.

Figures below indicate the number of umpires who officiated in each grade during the season.

Fifty-two umpires officiated in one or more games played on Sundays which include the Metway Super League Competition, the Coca-Cola One Day Competition, the U19 Competition and the Lord Taverner's U16 Competition.

Thanks must be extended to all active members for their commitment to umpiring. Thirtyone umpires officiated in all eleven rounds this season.

This panel continues to enjoy the all important confidence of Queensland Cricket. In the first half of the season, the Allocation Panel experienced difficulty with information on the availability of members. To this end, some streamlining in procedures were mutually agreed upon. It is hoped that next season, umpires will receive their allocations well in advance of the match.

INDEPENDENT AUDIT REPORT

To: The Members of the Queensland Cricket Umpires' Association

Scope

We have audited the attached special purpose financial report comprising the Income and Expenditure Statement and the Balance Sheet for the year ended 30 April 1997. These policies do not require the application of all Statements of Accounting Concepts and Accounting Standards and Consensus Views of the Urgent Issues Group.

The audit opinion expressed in this report has been formed on the above basis.

Qualification

As is common for organisations of this type, it is not practicable for the Association to maintain an effective system of internal control over donations, subscriptions and other fund raising activities until their initial entry into the accounting records. Accordingly our audit in relation to fund raising was limited to amounts recorded.

Note 1: Accounting Policies:

These financial statements are a special purpose financial report prepared in order to provide accounts which satisfy the requirements of the Queensland Cricket Umpires' Association's constitution to prepare accounts. The Executive Committee has determined that the Association is not a reporting entity as defined in *Statement of Accounting Concepts 1 "Definition of Reporting Entity"*. Accordingly there is no requirement to apply accounting standards in the preparation and presentation of the report.

Consistent with prior years the Executive Committee has used the cash basis of accounting with additional recognition for the depreciation of the Association's fixed assets. The cash basis of accounting means that income is recognized when cash is actually received, not when it is due to be received, and expenses are recognized when the payments are made rather than when a liability exists.

Consistent with prior years the value of inventory on hand has been determined on the basis of normal sale price.
